

FINANCIAL REPORT • FISCAL YEAR 2023-24

It has been a robust year financially, especially with the Renovation Project in full swing.

Total income for the parish (excluding the capital campaign) was \$830,757 which was 9% greater than

budget. Total expenses (excluding the capital campaign) were \$599,450. Net ordinary income was \$231,307. Offertory collections were \$570,035. Total outreach and other charitable donations totaled \$148,613.



Capital campaign income was \$432,679 and campaign expenses were \$129,000.

Regarding the Financial Report, it excludes the Renovation Fund. These funds are restricted for use solely on the renovation project. During fiscal year 2023-24 approximately \$500,000 of various parish reserves were repurposed for Renovation Fund use.

God bless all of you for your generosity and support of the Parish.


Let me end with a quote from author and public speaker John E. Southard:

"The only people with whom you should try to get even are those who have helped you."



Renovation Committee Report

The past year has marked significant progress in RCC's renovation program, originally launched in 2018. After a two-year delay due to COVID restrictions, the Renovation Committee is pleased to report we're back on track, aiming to have the newly-renovated church ready for Mass by spring 2025—potentially even by Easter on April 20!

Key milestones were reached this year: after gaining final approval from Bishop Knestout and the Richmond Diocese's Building and Renovation Commission, construction drawings by Hughes Associates were submitted and permitted by Bedford County. R.L. Price Construction was hired

contractor's progress, we are temporarily holding services at Trinity Ecumenical Parish. We are deeply grateful to Trinity for generously offering their space during our construction.

Our project budget remains at \$3.7 million, with \$2.8 million coming from our capital campaign and parish reserves. The remaining \$900,000 will be covered by a diocesan-

> guaranteed line of credit. The committee is pleased to share that 5-year capital campaign pledges are being fulfilled, with some parishioners even accelerating their contributions. Any additional donations from parishioners or visitors in the coming year will go toward reducing the construction loan.

> Father Nixon and the committee thank all parishioners for their cooperation, assistance and prayers in support of our much-needed renovation. While this project has temporarily disrupted worship and ministry activities, we're confident everyone will

enjoy the benefits of an enhanced worship space, improved building accessibility, and updated business offices.
